


Publication Background

The Center for Urban Families:

- identified 10
 organizations that
 serve fathers ages
 18–24;
- conducted interviews with participating organizations; and
- hosted a two-part virtual roundtable.



Strengths of Young Fathers



- Young fathers and their children are in different, but critical, periods of brain development.
- Young fathers are motivated to improve their circumstances, including by entering educational and employment pathways and improving parenting skills.

Key Challenges



Institutional biases and stigma



Unfair targeting by the criminal justice system



High rates of mental distress and trauma



Financial insecurity



Lack of stable housing

Promising Approaches



Targeted outreach and recruitment strategies



Activities and tangible goods to support young men in their roles as fathers



Culturally relevant programs and curriculum



Education and advocacy for young fathers as they navigate systems and policies

Recommendations

- Build connections among existing young fatherhood practitioners
- Design research to improve program models and build evidence base
- Identify and remove policies that penalize and exclude fathers
- Expand funding for promising approaches and community-led organizations


