Capacity Building Defined

Through support from federal agencies and private foundations, 10 Rural IMPACT demonstration sites are receiving intensive technical assistance to build their capacity to provide low-income parents and children the opportunity to succeed together. Technical assistance includes training, consultation with experts and facilitated peer-to-peer dialogue.

These sites are working to improve processes to be more efficient and family focused; identify local, state and federal resources to enhance a communities' approach to service delivery; provide training on trauma-informed practices; and offer integrated services to parents and children (two-generation approach) to break the cycle of intergenerational poverty.



Capacity Building in Action

Capacity building is making a difference in how the Rural IMPACT sites deliver services and support families in their communities.

- It's about the capacity for us to serve our families as an agency. Making sure that our case managers are directing the families in the same way and that we're not unintentionally working against each other. We recently signed a data sharing agreement with the Department of Social Services so that we can view each other's client tracking systems to learn about what services and resources they're receiving from each of the agencies.
