To apply, candidates must submit the following materials:

- Youth Council Representative application form;
- resume and most recent transcript. If you are unable to provide a resume or transcript, please submit a summary of your education, work and/or volunteer experiences; and
- at least two, and no more than three, letters of recommendation, one of which must be from a sponsor organization in your community. As a representative of a youth council in your state or local jurisdiction, you have the option to choose your council or another organization as your sponsoring organization. For a description of sponsor organization requirements, see page 3 of the Application Overview document.

These candidates will be contacted using the phone and email information submitted on their application form. Candidates who are interviewed will be notified of final decisions by the end of January 2019.

Qualifications

Youth Council Qualifications:

- The youth council should have an explicit focus on the juvenile justice system and/or youth justice reform.
- At least 50 percent of the youth council's members should have current or former justice system involvement.
- The council representative that is nominated by the group should have former justice system involvement.

At a minimum, the candidate should have the following experiences, skills and qualities:

- 18-25 years of age on November 16, 2018, which is the application due date;
- past or current juvenile justice involvement (e.g., probation, detention, commitment, residential placement, incarceration, and/or aftercare/parole)
- willingness to listen and learn;
- passion about and commitment to juvenile justice reform;
- skills in problem solving and critical thinking; and
- past or current experience in juvenile justice reform (e.g., organizing, policy advocacy or development, program development, research).

The following experiences, skills, and qualities are preferred:

- interpersonal skills;
- strong writing and public speaking skills;
- political astuteness; and
- knowledge of and/or direct connection to JDAI and/or the Juvenile Justice Strategy Group's work.
